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President's Report for 2010

As I look back over the past 12 months, I can clearly see that, because of the efforts of so many members, both past and present, PSANZ has actively and commendably pursued all of its objectives during 2010. As a reminder, these objectives are to:

- (a) advance the theory and practice of Perinatology
- (b) encourage training and research in Perinatology
- (c) provide expert advice to government and other bodies on matters pertaining to Perinaotlogy
- (d) maintain liaison with other organisations or professions involved in Perinatology, and
- (e) maintain a liaison with international bodies in Perinatology

The annual congress remains the key event of the PSANZ year and an opportunity for addressing each of the above objectives. It also sets the platform for future collaborations between PSANZ members and beyond, to expand and enhance the Society's profile.

15th Annual Congress, Hobart 2011. I would like to extend my thanks to Megan Wallace, Tony de Paoli and their local organising committee, for an outstanding job of organising this meeting. Organisationally speaking, I have been in their place and recognise the enormous effort involved in ensuring all disciplines' interests are represented, liaising with the numerous stakeholders and balancing the budget, to ensure a memorable congress for all attendees and affiliated personnel.

FAOPS & PSANZ Sydney 18 – 21 March, 2012. The relevant organising committees are well placed to succeed in this joint venture, with leadership from David Ellwood, Kaye Spence and John Sinn, all of whom have previously or are currently serving on the FAOPS and/or PSANZ Boards of Directors. This provides PSANZ with the opportunity to showcase Australian and New Zealand research and directions within the Asian and Oceania region and, in turn, to learn from our FAOPS colleagues.

Two of the more recent initiatives serve to demonstrate the commitment of PSANZ to encourage training and research in Perinatology, the **David Henderson-Smart award** and the **Early Research Career** committee. This year attracted an overwhelming number of high quality applicants for each scheme. We are delighted to announce the recipients during the Hobart congress. Congratulations to the winners and we look forward to your feedback and continued liaison with PSANZ.

New investigator awards have been an integral part of the PSANZ since its inception. Applicants are to be applauded for their high quality submissions. Winners will be expected to submit an item for publication in the PSANZ Newsletter, which I am sure you will enjoy, given the wide range of research topics that this award embraces across the various disciplines.

PSANZ Honorary membership: Members are reminded to nominate individuals who have made a substantial contribution to PSANZ and Perinatology, who are close to retiring or recently retired. I consider it a privilege for the Society to align itself with the prestigious individuals who have been awarded this status and welcome the current nominations for honorary membership. Nominations are made through the BRANCHES – are due 30 days before the Council meeting at the Annual Congress. Please check the requirements and processes with your Branch representative.

PSANZ Board of Directors (Council Executive): This concludes the first year of my two-year term as President and I have found it to be a very interesting and steep learning curve. The legal and administrative requirements that you all find taking up more of your work time every day have also become greatly



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magnified for PSANZ in recent times. I view the *first year of my term* as focusing on aligning processes with legal requirements, streamlining such processes and building on the provision of guidelines for members who accept responsibilities within various committees. Considerable progress has been made in these endeavours, with the assistance of many members of the Board of Directors, but particularly Karen New, who, in her role as Secretary, has mentored us in constitutional / legal issues and guided us all through the processes. I will always be indebted to Karen for her support. *In the second year of this term*, I would like to achieve, or at least progress toward, the efforts initiated in 2010 for the appointment of an Executive Officer to assist the volunteers on the Board; establishment of working parties to address areas of relevance to Perinatology so that PSANZ is the leader, rather than follower, in many initiatives; continued liaison, achieved by enabling eminent members to represent PSANZ in relevant groups within Australia and New Zealand; and the revision of the Constitution and Governance Document, to reflect changing demands and streamline the processes by which we comply with legislation.

New Board of Director members since the last AGM include Jon Hirst as Treasurer, appointed after the resignation of Lee Sutton, and John Sinn as Congress Program Liaison Officer (CPLO). Both have had fantastic input into the workings of the Society. I am thankful for the ongoing support of the remainder of the Board of Directors, which includes Stuart Hooper (Past President), who, along with many others over the years, paved the way for PSANZ to progress to where it is today; Vicki Flenady (President Elect) who edits the Newsletter and provides great support; Greg Duncombe (Obstetric Representative), who chairs requests for endorsements; and the Branch and NZ representatives, who energetically maintain local interest in societal matters.

We are well supported by Event Planners (now known as MCI) for congress organisation, by industry for our annual congress and by WHA as the Secretariat.

In conclusion, the Society is in a healthy position to maintain its diverse activities to achieve its objectives and I applaud the membership for its input and seek its continued support.

Summary of the years' activities of the branch

The Victorian branch of PSANZ held another two highly successful "Hot Topics" symposiums in the last 12 months.

In June 2010 we held an evening symposium called "Banking on Breast Milk" at the Royal Women's Hospital in conjunction with our Annual General Meeting. We had three excellent speakers; Julie Sharp (Basic Science) on "Extreme models of lactation: Insights into mammary gland development, milk



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composition and the developing neonate", Anita Moorhead (Midwife/Lactation consultant) on "Who gets the breast/best milk?" and Gillian Opie (Neonatology) on "More than the milk – establishing a breast milk bank". There were 41 registrations for the symposium (19 members and 22 non-members), which was free for members and it attracted 2 new memberships. The feedback about the symposium was extremely positive and attendees were treated to a highly entertaining rendition of "Expressed breast milk" performed by Neil Roy, Simon Fraser and Gillian Opie to the tune of "Edelwiess".

In September 2010 we held an afternoon symposium called "Breathing for Babies" in conjunction with the visit by the Thorburn Professor, Prof. Richard Martin, at Monash Medical Centre. The symposium included a keynote address by Prof. Richard Martin (Neonatology) on "Intermittent hypoxic episodes in preterm infants? Do they matter?", as well as talks by Graeme Polglase (Basic Science) on "Effect of resuscitation on the cardiovascular transition at birth", Claire Collins (Neonatology) on "High flow therapy – a lot of hot air?" and David Tingay (Neonatology) on "ETT suction of ventilated infants. Does derecruitment matter?" The symposium which was co-sponsored by the Monash Health Translation Precinct was free, the feedback was very positive and there were well over 150 attendees.

Together with the Tasmanian Branch of PSANZ, the Vic Branch Committee has been organising the PSANZ 2011 Congress in Hobart. We received 422 abstract submissions (up from 355 in Wellington in 2010 and 401 in Darwin 2009) and registrations, sponsorship and exhibition have all been progressing very well.

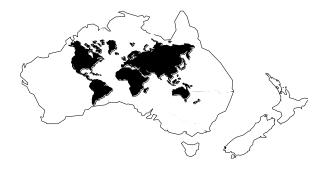

IMPACT NETWORK

The IMPACT (Interdisciplinary Maternal Perinatal Australasian Clinical Trials) NETWORK, within the Perinatal Society of Australia and New Zealand, is dedicated to the improvement of maternal and perinatal health by the promotion of appropriately designed randomised controlled trials (RCTs), and dissemination and application of their results.

IMPACT NETWORK AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- to identify key research issues in maternal and perinatal care
- to promote the design, registration, completion, dissemination and application of appropriate RCTs in maternal perinatal care
- to provide a forum for discussion, communication and collaboration between investigators in all disciplines, for planned or ongoing trials in maternal perinatal care
- to provide information to the Perinatal Society of Australia and New Zealand (PSANZ) newsletter
- to establish priorities for funding clinical trials in maternal perinatal health with funding agencies

- to establish international links with the Pregnancy and Childbirth and Neonatal Collaborative Review Groups of the Cochrane Collaboration, other clinical trials networks and organisations or bodies
- to assist in bringing research evidence into clinical practice by promoting evidence-based care within the clinical colleges and other professional societies
- To provide educational opportunities in critical appraisal and trial design

MEMBERSHIP

Membership is free of charge and open to all members of the Perinatal Society of Australia and New Zealand

NETWORK COMMITTEE

The committee is elected by secret ballot from within the IMPACT Network membership, and is made up of a representative from each of the following disciplines – consumers, midwifery, neonatalogy, neonatal nursing, obstetrics, scientists and other. The committee is elected for a term of two years at the IMPACT Network meeting associated with the PSANZ Congress. Re-election of Committee members is permitted. The Chairperson is elected from within the Committee itself.

The Committee is responsible for

- coordinating activities that promote the mission statement and fulfil the aims and objectives of the Network
- proposing changes to the mission statement, aims and objectives, and framework of the Network when appropriate, and seeking ratification before implementation from the Network membership at the next meeting.

MEETINGS

Meetings are held twice yearly, once in conjunction with the PSANZ Congress and an additional half yearly meeting usually in conjunction with another professional meeting.

The meeting programmes are designed to specifically address the aims and objectives of the IMPACT Network, and involve small group discussions, feedback sessions of research issues, and the promotion of research projects (ongoing and planned) by members.

EDUCATION

The IMPACT Network has run workshops on critical appraisal and design of clinical trials. These workshops were designed to educate practitioners of all disciplines, in the critical appraisal of published data and to understand the importance of clinical trial design. Further workshops are planned.

FUNDING

Funding support is provided by PSANZ. This will allow the IMPACT Network to keep in contact with members by way of newsletters, to do promotional work to encourage involvement in the Network, and to run educational workshops.

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1. IMPACT workshop $27^{th}/28^{th}$ March 2010:

The Annual meeting for IMPACT was held prior to the Annual Congress of PSANZ in Wellington. The theme of the meeting was "Optimising clinical research & dissemination" and included a workshop on "Recruiting the recruiters – how to recruit centres to multicentre trials'.

The first half of the meeting included a joint session with ANZSA (Australia New Zealand Stillbirth Alliance) on setting research priorities. There was also a presentation by the Cochrane group on recent Cochrane perinatal and neonatal reviews. Trials in the early stages of protocol development were presented for feedback. In addition multi- centre trials attempting to recruit more centers presented their protocols.

A workshop is planned for April 2011, which will include a session on Data monitoring committees, with a guest speaker from the NHMRC.

2. Financial transfer to WHA

IMPACT has traditionally held its finances at the host organisation of the Chairperson, and received an annual stipend from PSANZ for administration costs. In recent years the financial arrangement has been inefficient and this year the secretarial services for IMPACT have been moved to WHA for an annual cost of \$1000 +GST per year, plus additional fees for bookkeeping, website management, database and teleconferencing. Feedback to the chair of PSANZ on this arrangement has been provided.

3. Guidelines

IMPACT contributed feedback to several guidelines as requested by PSANZ including: Perinatal Antifungal prophylaxis guideline, Reduced fetal movement leaflet and review of the criteria for intravenous immunogloblulin use.

4. WOMBAT collaboration

IMPACT is represented on the WOMBAT committee.

- 2. To provide advice for Colleges and other bodies on standards for perinatal mortality classification and audit
- 3. To collaborate with national and international groups in the research and audit activities aimed at reducing perinatal mortality.

Activity update and request for funding to PSANZ Council

1. Introduction

The Perinatal Society of Australia and New Zealand (PSANZ) Perinatal Mortality Group (PMG) was established as a response to the need for a systematic approach to the audit and review of perinatal deaths in Australia and New Zealand. PSANZ endorsed the establishment of this special interest group in perinatal mortality in March 2003. The output from this group reflects collaborative efforts amongst a number of motivated PSANZ members over many years resulting in a highly productive and successful special interest group of the Society since its inception.

2. Purpose of this submission

The purpose of this submission is to:

a) Provide and update PSANZ Council on PSANZ-PMG activity

3. Activity 2010

During 2010 PSANZ-PMG continued its commitment to the work highlighted at the PSANZ-PMG AGM 2009 in Darwin on Saturday 18th April 2009 and in the last activity report submitted to council in February 2010. The major focus of work was implementation of the PSANZ Guidelines through the development and roll out of the IMproving Perinatal Mortality Review Outcomes via Education (IMPROVE) Program in collaboration with the Australia and New Zealand Stillbirth Alliance. As a regional office of the International Stillbirth Alliance (ISA), collaboration with ANZSA facilitates international and national collaborations with PSANZ-PMG in the area of stillbirth prevention. Below is a summation of 2010 activity:

Classification system for perinatal mortality

Developed by PSANZ-PMG, the PSANZ Perinatal Death and Neonatal Death Classifications (PDC and PNC) are now used across Australia and New Zealand. These were updated and recommended for continued use on July 1st 2009. At the ISA/ISPID International Conference, held in Sydney in October 2010, a workshop was organised to try and reach international consensus on a global classification system for perinatal mortality. The PSANZ classification system was put forward as an example of a classification system working effectively in a high income country. PSANZ-PMG continues to collaborate with ANZSA and ISA in the development of a global system for classification of perinatal deaths.

Autopsy Consent Survey for Clinicians

PSANZ PMG and ANZSA over the last 18 months have developed and administered an autopsy consent survey for clinicians. The aim of the study was to identify knowledge, practice and attitudes of maternity care providers

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regarding post mortem investigation focusing on the autopsy examination. This survey was developed as part of an international initiative facilitated through the International Stillbirth Alliance with surveys also undertaken in the UK. In Australia, all public maternity hospitals with over 1000 births/year were invited to participate in an anonymous paper based and online survey of health care professionals. The dissemination of this survey was administered prior to each IMPROVE Workshop, not only to gather important and useful baseline data but also as a means to evaluate and develop the program in the future.

Over 800 surveys have been received from across Australia and the results indicate that improved information materials and training is required for health care professionals when counselling parents about autopsy following stillbirth and neonatal death. It is anticipated the study will be published in ANZJOG over the coming year.

Implementation of Clinical Practice Guidelines (CPG) for Perinatal Mortality Audit incorporating Psychological and Social Aspects of Perinatal Bereavement:

The PSANZ PMG in collaboration with ANZSA and relevant state governments are implementing the PSANZ Perinatal Mortality CPG throughout Australia using the IMPROVE program and support from regional coordinators. IMPROVE workshops has been made possible through funding and support from a number of sources including:

Northern Territory

- Northern Territory Government Department of Health (in kind support of the development phase)

Queensland

- Mater Foundation (development phase)
- Queensland Maternity and Perinatal Quality Council (roll out of IMPROVE Program)
- Queensland Government Southern Zone (roll out of IMPROVE Program)

Western Australia

Western Australia Health (roll out of IMPROVE Program)

Victoria

- Victoria Managed Insurance Authority (VMIA) (roll out of IMPROVE Program)
- Maternity and Newborn Clinical Network (roll out of IMPROVE Program)

An evaluation of the program has been made possible through funding though SIDS and Kids. The autopsy consent survey acted as the first stage in obtaining baseline data. The second phase, or the active implementation phase, occurred via the RANZCOG and ACM accredited IMPROVE Program. Pre and post questionnaires were collected to evaluate the effectiveness of the program (national results are available on request). Over 630 clinicians and support workers attended 18 education workshops in three states. Active implementation of the program in South Australia and Northern Territory is planned in 2011. The third phase will include a survey of clinicians on their use and views of the guidelines and an assessment of any change in autopsy and placental pathology rates.

CPG for the Management of Women who Report Decreased Fetal Movements

PSANZ PMG and ANZSA developed a guideline for reporting decreased fetal movements which has been endorsed by PSANZ, Australian College of Midwives, SIDS and Kids, SANDS, and the Stillbirth Foundation of Australia. This guideline is now recommended for use across maternity hospitals in Australia. A brochure for women is in the process of being finalised and will be sent to ANZSA member organisations for endorsement.

National perinatal statistics Unit (NPSU) Partnership:

Perinatal Mortality Clinical Audit Form

Following a meeting held under the auspices of AIHW in December 2008, a perinatal mortality clinical audit form for national use has been developed. The purpose of the form is to enhance review of perinatal deaths at the hospital and health department level and in doing so improve the quality of information about causes of stillbirths and neonatal deaths. The form is based on that used in New Zealand and is consistent with data currently collected across jurisdictions in Australia and national standards. Piloting is planned for early 2011 following wider consultation with state perinatal committees early in 2011.

National Stillbirth Report

PSANZ PMG in collaboration with ANZSA and NPSU is in the process of finalising a national stillbirth report for publication in early 2011. This report will highlight trends in stillbirth over the last five years.

Annual Meetings:

Meetings are held annually in conjunction with ANZSA as a satellite meeting of the PSANZ Annual Congress. PSANZ PMG and ANZSA held a half day workshop in Wellington in March 2010 focusing on antenatal fetal monitoring, diversity in bereavement care and priority setting for stillbirth research. All members of PSANZ are welcome to attend and contribute to these workshops. These meetings have been successful and run as a cost neutral exercise in order to encourage participation across disciplines. A workshop, held in Hobart, is planned in April 2011 in conjunction with the PSANZ 15th Annual Congress. The focus of this workshop will be on research and practice priorities in stillbirth prevention, systems for perinatal mortality audit of suboptimal care, and caring for the carer. The specific focus however will be on the implications of *The Lancet* Stillbirth Series for the ANZ region. The Lancet series focuses on stillbirth prevention globally and includes recommendation for high income country settings.

General Enquiries

PSANZ PMG Secretariat continues to respond to enquiries regarding perinatal mortality and provides the PSANZ Secretariat with information to a) update the PSANZ website; and b) circulate information to PSANZ members.

4. Membership

4. Key activities 2011

Other than the continuation of those activities listed above, the major activity over the next 12 months for PSANZ PMG will be the promotion of the findings, and dissemination of *The Lancet* Stillbirth Series (due for publication in April 2011); revision of the Clinical Practice Guidelines (CPG) for Perinatal Mortality Audit incorporating Psychological and Social Aspects of Perinatal Bereavement; and piloting of the National Perinatal Mortality Clinical Audit Form (as descried above).

The International Stillbirth Alliance through the Mater Medical Research Institute Brisbane, has received a grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation for production of a series on stillbirth for publication in *The Lancet*. *The Lancet* Stillbirth Series Steering Committee believes that the series will place stillbirth as a priority within the context of maternal, newborn and child survival with specific focus on low to middle income countries. The overall goal is to bring together epidemiology, evidence for interventions, costing estimates and policy analysis to guide decision making and promote action with measurable change by 2020. Published in April 2011, these papers will call for action and will list a number of specific goals the international stillbirth community must aim to achieve by 2020 in order to create such measurable change.

This is a great opportunity for PSANZ PMG and ANZSA to call for action in Australia and New Zealand. It is hoped that raising the profile of this issue amongst government decision makers, clinicians, support workers and

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other relevant stakeholders will encourage healthy change in perinatal mortality and reduce the perinatal mortality rate in the ANZ region.

<u>PSANZ Clinical Practice Guidelines (CPG) for Perinatal Mortality Audit incorporating Psychological and Social Aspects of Perinatal Bereavement:</u>

The purpose of the guideline is to enable a systematic approach to the investigation and audit of perinatal deaths across Australia and New Zealand. The guideline was first disseminated in March 2005. Due to funding limitations, a limited revision was only possible in the 2009 update. It is imperative that these guidelines are kept up-to-date and a comprehensive revision is required in 2011. We seek funds from PSANZ in order to support this revision.

These activities would not be made possible without the support and contribution from MHS and MMRI for the accommodation of the secretariat.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2009

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, including Australian Accounting Interpretations, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001.

The financial report is for Perinatal Society of Australia & New Zealand Limited as an individual entity, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. Perinatal Society of Australia & New Zealand Limited is a company limited by guarantee.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies applied by the Company in preparing the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

Basis of Preparation - Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis, is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

Accounting Policies

(a) Income Tax

The Company is exempt from income tax under Section 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis. The Directors review the carrying amount of plant and equipment annually to ensure it does not exceed the recoverable amount of those assets.

The recoverable amount is determined on the basis of net cash flows expected to be received from the use and subsequent disposal of the assets. In determining the recoverable amount, expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values.

Items of property, plant and equipment, other than freehold land are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the straight line and diminishing value methods. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of asset are as follows:

Office Furniture 7.5%, 12%, 20% straight line method

Office Equipment 20%, 33.3%, 37,5% straight line method

Leasehold improvements 33.3% straight line method

Motor Vehicles 12.5% straight line method

(c) Leases

A distinction is made between finance leases which effectively transfer from the lessor to the lessee substantially all the risks and benefits of incidental ownership of the leased property, without transferring the legal ownership and operating leases under which the lessor effectively retains substantially all the risks and benefits.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2009

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONT)

Where assets are acquired by means of finance leases, the present value of minimum lease payments is established as an asset at the beginning of the lease term and depreciated on a straight line basis over the expected economic life. A corresponding liability is also established and each lease payment is allocated between reduction of the liability and interest expense.

Operating lease payments are charged to expense in the periods in which they are incurred.

(d) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Company's liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee entitlements payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash flows to be made for those entitlements.

Contributions are made to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

(e) Revenue, Unearned Income and Subscriptions in Advance

Members' subscriptions and sponsorship income are recognised in the year in which invoices are raised and any amounts relating to future periods are recognised as a liability as either subscriptions in advance or unearned revenue.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon delivery of the service to customers.

(f) Cash

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, cash includes cash on hand and at call deposits with banks or financial institutions, net of bank overdrafts.

(g) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

(h) Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(i) Compliance Statement

Australian Accounting Standards require a statement of compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) to be made where the financial report complies with these standards. Some Australian Accounting Standards contain requirements specific to not-for-profit entities that are inconsistent with IFRS requirements. Perinantal Society of Australia and New Zealand is a not for profit entity and has applied these requirements, so while this financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards including International Financial Reporting Standards IFRS it cannot make this statement.
