CELEBRATING THE 2021 CONGRESS - OUR FIRST FULLY VIRTUAL CONGRESS



Well, we did it! PSANZ successfully hosted its first online congress on 29-31 March 2021. The conference was originally scheduled to be held in Sydney Australia in 2020 but, as for most conferences last year, had to be postponed due to the global pandemic. While the virtual format of the rescheduled congress did not allow us to meet face to face as usual it did enable us to connect with attendees and presenters across multiple time-zones around the world. We are sure you will agree that the sessions were no less engaging, inspiring, or thought provoking.

From the welcome address to the congress wrap up we enjoyed an exciting and jam-packed program that brought together inspirational international keynotes, over 40 national speakers, 745 delegates and 22 sponsors and exhibitors. Keynote speakers shared their experiences, research and knowledge throughout the program bringing international perspectives on our congress theme 'Bridging Gaps in Perinatal Care'. A Campfire Chat with our keynotes was both informative and entertaining.

There were 6 plenaries, 21 symposia, 30 abstract sessions, 180 recorded presentations and an Early Career Researcher event. Exciting presentations and hot of the press results! Plenaries included a celebration of 2020 the year of the nurse and midwife and the challenges of caring for women, their newborns and their families during the pandemic. Symposia including those hosted by our subcommittees showcased the breadth and diversity of the work of the society and its members.

The Federation of Asia and Oceanic Perinatal Societies (FAOPS) co-hosted a symposium that provided an Asia/Oceania perspective on perinatal care. Get Connected sessions held in the mornings and evenings were very well attended. The virtual presentation of posters prior to the congress was well received and may become a future feature. New topics to the congress included fetal therapy, women's life course health and clinician health and wellbeing. A bonus was the ability to view sessions virtually after the event – a great way to catch up with missed presentations.

The PSANZ awards are an exciting part of the congress where we recognise and reward achievements. Warm congratulations again to all 2020/1 award winners.

Members, sponsors, and exhibitors' support of the congress was very much appreciated. Thank you to everyone for your attendance, participation, and contribution, most especially for rolling over memberships and sponsorships. We would not have been able to host the congress without your support and generosity. Thanks to you we were also able to provide sponsorship for 15 international nurses and midwives from low-middle income countries to attend the congress. A great way to celebrate the year of the nurse and midwife.




PSANZ CONGRESS - A PERSPECTIVE FROM A STUDENT PARTICIPATING FROM BANGLADESH

STILLBIRTH AND NEONATAL DEATH ALLIANCE (SANDA) UPDATE

PSANZ SANDA partners with the [Stillbirth Centre of Research Excellence](#) in a number of activities around improving clinical practice across maternity services. One major initiative has been the bi-national guideline [Care after Stillbirth and Neonatal Death](#). The guideline provides best practice recommendations to improve maternity and newborn care for bereaved parents and families and to improve the quality of data on causes of stillbirth and neonatal deaths through appropriate investigation, audit, and classification. The guideline has six main sections covering: Perinatal mortality audit; Investigation of stillbirth; Investigation of neonatal death; Perinatal autopsy (including communication and counselling for parents); Classification of perinatal deaths; and Respectful supportive perinatal bereavement care.

The Australian Government's [Stillbirth National Action and Implementation Plan](#) (The Plan) was launched December 2020 and sets out a plan to address the findings of the Senate Enquiry into stillbirth. Updating the Care after stillbirth and neonatal death guidelines and measures to improve the uptake of autopsy are key actions in this plan. The Plan also calls for culturally and



linguistically appropriate information to address disparity on care and outcomes. In response to the Plan, the PSANZ/ CRE guideline working group was recently reconvened for the fourth update of the guideline with the aim of obtaining endorsement by NHMRC. Additional topics in this update include care for women in a subsequent pregnancy after stillbirth.

PSANZ has also partnered with the Stillbirth CRE in the [Safer Baby Bundle](#) (the bundle) in stillbirth prevention through developing position statements which have underpinned the bundle recommendations and associated resources. The Safer Baby Bundle is another major action of The Plan which is currently being rolled out across Australia. The [SBB eLearning program](#) is available free to all. New resources for the bundle to support shared decision making around timing of birth for women with risk factors at term are currently being developed.

VIEW GUIDELINES FOR CARE AFTER STILLBIRTH AND NEONATAL DEATH

INTERDISCIPLINARY MATERNAL PERINATAL AUSTRALASIAN COLLABORATIVE TRIALS (IMPACT) NETWORK



IMPACT has been very active over the last year, led by an enthusiastic newly appointed Executive Committee and Co-chairs Clare Whitehead and Brett Manley from The Royal Women's Hospital in Melbourne.

We have an exciting webinar programme planned with quarterly meetings that we encourage you all to join.

We kicked off with "Advancing Perinatal Trials in Australia and New Zealand: Research Prioritisation or Prioritising Research?" in May and "Why do good trials fail? (and other bumps in the road)" in July. We were very grateful to our excellent presenters who shared their valuable experiences which will help many of us overcome our own "bumps in the road"!

IMPACT's trial development program continues to grow, and we enjoyed hearing from many of you about your plans for trials in the workshop in November 2020. Our next Trial Development Workshop is planned for 8th October, which is an excellent opportunity to pitch your trial design to a panel of experts and get individualised input to help progress your design ideas and hopefully lead to funding success! Please look out for an invite in your emails shortly about how to register.

In addition to this, the IMPACT Executive is actively pursuing new ways to increase collaboration and efficiency of perinatal clinical trials in our region. One approach is focussed on planning for an Adaptive Platform Trial (APT) in Perinatology. A successful APT will allow mother's and babies' to be randomised to multiple interventions and at different timepoints, and the adaptive nature means that effective or ineffective treatments can be more efficiently become the standard of care or discarded for futility. We were incredibly fortunate to have Prof Steve Webb (ACTA, ReMAP-CAP) share his expertise in this area at the IMPACT Symposium at the recent PSANZ Congress, and look forward to bringing some of these plans to the membership soon.

We encourage all PSANZ members with an interest in clinical research to be active IMPACT members, join our meetings and participate in IMPACT activities.

LET US KNOW YOUR THOUGHTS

Over the past 12 months, the Long-Term Outcomes of High-Risk Babies Subcommittee has been busy supporting neonatal follow-up programs transition to the Bayley Scales of Infant and Toddler Development, 4th Edition: Australian and New Zealand Standardised Edition (Bayley-4 A&NZ). Three daylong workshops were conducted in September and November 2020 leading to training of more than 50 child health professionals across almost all neonatal units in Australia and New Zealand. A live webinar with experts titled "Transitioning to Bayley-4 A&NZ?" was also organized in August 2020 and the recording of this webinar is available for PSANZ membership. This year's sessions were focused on novel models of neurodevelopmental follow-up and early family intervention approaches to improve neurodevelopmental outcomes. POLICY SUBCOMMITTEE

The policy committee aims to strengthen PSANZ's contribution to Australian and New Zealand national policies, practice standards and guidelines relating to maternal and newborn care, establishing PSANZ as a peak body on matters relating to perinatology.

The policy committee has been working collaboratively with other groups to develop clinical practice guidelines including the Australian Safer Baby Bundle, developed by the Stillbirth Centre of Research Excellence in partnership with PSANZ, to which many members of the policy sub-committee contributed. The Bundle consists of 4 position statements, and care pathway and an eLearning bundle and aims to reduce the number of pregnancies that end in stillbirth. The policy committee also contributed to the Aotearoa New Zealand Induction of Labour Clinical Practice Guidelines, recently endorsed and published by the NZ Ministry of Health. <https://www.health.govt.nz/publication/induction-labour-aotearoa-new-zealand-clinical-practice-guideline-2019>.

PERINATAL PALLIATIVE CARE SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP



The sub-committee has been inactive this year, the only activity being cooperation in organisation of the Victorian Perinatal Palliative Care Virtual Symposium, a two day virtual meeting to be held through RCH Melbourne on 11-12th October 2021.

Activity has hitherto focused largely on teaching and organisation of meetings coincident with the PSANZ ASM, together with consultation and advice surrounding guidelines, most notably the Paediatric Palliative Care guidelines for Palliative Care Australia.

The executive group of the committee has been weakened in recent years by the movement of members to other positions interstate and overseas and is further compounded by other commitments of the membership. This has led to a significant loss of momentum and the group is at risk of failure without recruitment of a new executive, especially as senior members near retirement. The absence of face-to-face meeting activity in the last 18 months due to COVID has accelerated this loss of momentum.

The group has produced valuable meetings in the past and supported parents to develop research, advocacy and writing interests.

We are currently seeking expressions of interest for membership of the executive and for office bearers (Chair, Secretary, Treasurer). The current Chair is available for any questions and will assist in any transitional arrangements.

ENHANCING CLINICAL TRIALS IN AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND – THE ON TRACK NETWORK WORKING ALONGSIDE IMPACT

For many years, clinical trials researchers in Australia and New Zealand have been well supported by the PSANZ IMPACT Network, but how do we get clinicians and consumers more involved? The bi-nationality of the IMPACT Network has many advantages but can also pose some challenges when considering broader engagement. Hence we have established the ON TRACK Network to work alongside IMPACT and support the whole pipeline of clinical trials activity in New Zealand.

The ON TRACK Network works under three strategic pillars: (1) identifying maternal and perinatal health research priorities for New Zealand; (2) facilitating the establishment and effective integration of multicentre clinical trials across all sites in New Zealand; and (3) facilitating the dissemination and timely implementation of research findings into clinical practice.

KEY THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT ON TRACK:

- The Network is supported by a National Executive Committee and Site Network Leaders at our 20 district health boards across the country.
- Our research prioritisation project identified 3,347 knowledge gaps which have been translated into 358 unanswered clinical trial research questions. Ranking results will be published soon.
- Five highly successful trial development workshops have led to several HRC funded trials, which are included in over 20 multicentre trials supported by ON TRACK across New Zealand, many of which are ANZ trials.
- Our consumer-specific ‘Forum for Women & Whānau’ enables women and their families to better understand clinical trials research and creates opportunities for them to influence research for the future and to participate in clinical trials.
- We have published and circulated 55 monthly newsletters across all our sites.
- We visit hospitals around the country providing Educational Site Visits for multidisciplinary groups including evidence-based practice updates, trial information, and the value of clinical trials talks.
- We are supporting the development of a mama and pēpi Māori health researchers and practitioners group.

As a Network, we are proud of our achievements in engaging more stakeholders in clinical trials research across disciplines, ethnicities, and geography.
